<u>Activity 1</u>: Match the onomatopoeia with the scenes you would hear them in.

Activity 2: Complete the 'Sounding the same' activity sheet.

<u>Activity 3</u>: Imagine you are visiting a zoo, like Joseph Coelho was in the previous video. Write down a list of all the **onomatopoeia** words you might hear in a zoo and what is making those noises. Aim to write at least eight noises in your list. See the website for ideas and examples.

<u>Activity 4</u>: Now, write your own onomatopoeia poem, using the ideas you came up with in the last activity.

Top Tips:

- Write in sentences.
- Write at least five lines.
- Use a different onomatopoeia word in each line.

You could also:

- Use **rhyme** (words that end with a similar sound)
- Use alliteration (words that start with the same first sounds)
- Add some illustrations to your poem showing pictures of the things that are making the sounds in the zoo.
