Hi everyone,

So, today for English please look at yesterday's lesson: Monday 6th July - it is a lesson that helps us to revise conjunctions, coordinating and subordinating. Conjunctions are used to add extra information to sentences.

There are two video clips to watch and then four activities.

<u>Activity 1</u>: Complete the 'Colin's Coordinating Conjunctions Challenge' activity sheet. You need to read the sentences carefully and decide which **coordinating conjunction** should be used in each one. Either print off the activity sheet or write each sentence out on paper with the correct conjunction.

<u>Activity 2</u>: Complete the 'Computer Malfunction' activity sheet. You need to match up the correct main clause to the correct **subordinate clause** so that the sentences make sense. Either print off the activity sheet or write the whole sentence out on paper.

<u>Top tip</u>: Read **all** the clauses before you start matching them up. Look for a **link** between the two clauses. If the main clause mentions an animal, for example, then the subordinate clause will be about the same topic.

<u>Activity 3</u>: Copy and complete the sentences by using a **coordinating conjunction** to add some extra information. Use your imagination – your sentences can be as creative as you like!

Top tip: Remember FANBOYS: For, And, Nor, But, Or, Yet, So

<u>Activity 4</u>: For these sentences use a **subordinating conjunction** to extend the sentences. Some conjunctions you might like to use are: because, since, as, when, although, while, after, until.

Remember:

Coordinating conjunctions are used to join together two **equally important** clauses in a sentence.

- The two clauses are independent they would make sense on their own. For example: It was
 raining outside <u>so</u> I put on my coat.
- There are seven coordinating conjunctions in total. You can remember them using FANBOYS:

For, And, Nor, But, Or, Yet, So

Subordinating conjunctions are words such as because, as, while and until.

- They link a main clause and a subordinate clause together in a sentence.
- They help to add the extra information that tells us when, why or where something happens.

For example: Mark laughed <u>because</u> the joke was funny! 'Mark laughed' is the **main clause**. It makes sense all on its own.

'Because the joke was funny' is the **subordinate clause**. It adds **additional information** to the main clause and wouldn't make sense on its own. 'Because' is the **subordinating conjunction**. It helps to add the extra information to explain **why** Mark was laughing.

<u>Top tip</u>: Subordinating conjunctions can go in the middle or at the start of sentences.
