Extension: Punctuate the text to combine the clauses into one sentence, putting colons and semicolons in the appropriate places.

Remember:

You use a semicolon to join two related main clauses where you don't want to make them into two separate sentences, or use a connective. You can also use a connective after a semicolon.

You use a colon to introduce a list, or add on a separate sentence that is related to the first one because the second one is the cause of the first. The list may be punctuated with semicolons.
