The purpose of this document is to:

- Identify the activities and potential hazards that may occur upon re-opening the school to all pupils
- Assess who could potentially be at risk and the implications
- What measures need to be undertaken to remove or reduce this risk
- The actions that would need undertaking to support those measures
- An impact assessment, based on the following grid
- From this document an overall picture of the risk involved can be obtained, which will inform any reasoning behind decisions made that may have an impact on the public health of our pupils, staff, and the wider community



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Hazard: Something with the potential to cause **harm**.

To Assess Risk: Consider **Severity (S)** and **Likelihood (L)** **without** Control Measures. **Multiply** (S x L)= risk

Describe Control Measures: Control measure(s) **reduce** the likelihood, **and/or** severity of **harm**, reducing **risk**.

Re-assess Risk, considering Severity (S) and Likelihood (L) **with** Control Measures in place.

Multiply (S x L) = **Risk Rating** (with controls).

<p>People with the virus infecting others</p> <p>Risk to health due to COVID-19</p>	<p>Prevention</p>	<p>Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have COVID-19 symptoms, or someone in their household does, do not attend school (All times)</p>	<p>Communicate so that everyone knows that pupils, staff and other adults do not come into the school if they have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or have tested positive in the last 10 days, and ensuring anyone developing those symptoms during the school day is sent home.</p> <p>Staff testing positive with a Lateral Flow Test should not attend school and should instead book a PCR test and follow the advice given.</p> <p>This will be communicated by: Staff handbook and training, Parents letters, COVID agreement and information on the website.</p> <p>Parents not to send children with symptoms to school.</p> <p>Any child displaying symptoms to be escorted straight to the isolation room and be sent home.</p> <p>Staff to inform HT as soon as any symptoms (Phone HT mobile). If the staff member is in school, call the office/SLT to ensure someone can be with the children (if applicable) and go home (if safe to travel, or if not attend the isolation room until support is arranged).</p> <p>Those sent home should follow 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection', which sets out that they must self-isolate for at least 10 days and should arrange to have a test to see if they have coronavirus (COVID-19). Other members of their household (including any siblings) should self-isolate for 14 days from when the symptomatic person first had symptoms.</p>	5	2	10



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			<p>Siblings of children displaying symptoms will be sent home at the same time as the symptomatic child.</p> <p>Isolation room – Art Block</p> <p>Windows should be opened to ensure ventilation. The rooms are equipped with a first-aid kit, bottled drinking water, PPE and hand sanitiser. These items are stored in a lidded box to ensure these items to not become soiled.</p> <p>Protocol for responding to a person(s) who has fallen ill: if any pupil or staff member is showing Covid-19 related symptoms, they must be escorted to the isolation room immediately. The staff member supervising the patient must wear PPE (mask, gloves, apron, eye protector) and must oversee the individual until they are collected from school.</p> <p>With Covid-19 related incidents schools should follow their normal protocol for responding to accidents, with the additional requirement of maintaining social distancing, the use of PPE and the need to keep the individual within the isolation room until they are collected.</p> <p>If a pupil/staff members condition is not considered critical, for children, their parents should be asked to collect them as quickly as possible. If the condition of the patient is considered critical, the emergency services should be contacted via 999. Anyone with coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms should not visit the GP, pharmacy, urgent care centre or a hospital.</p> <p>If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people.</p> <p>If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should</p>			



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			<p>use the art block toilet. The 'Do not use' sign should be displayed and the toilet must be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products (bleach) before being used by anyone else.</p> <p>Any members of staff who have helped someone with symptoms and any pupils who have been in close contact with them do not need to go home to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves (in which case, they should arrange a test) or if the symptomatic person subsequently tests positive (see below) or they have been requested to do so by NHS Test & Trace.</p> <p>Everyone must wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water or use hand sanitiser after any contact with someone who is unwell. The area around the person with symptoms must be cleaned with normal household disinfectant after they have left to reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people. See the COVID-19: cleaning of non-healthcare settings guidance.</p>

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		<p>to minimise contacts and mixing while delivering a broad and balanced curriculum.</p> <p>The overarching principle to apply is reducing the number of contacts between children and staff. This can be achieved through keeping groups separate (in 'bubbles') and through maintaining distance between individuals. These are not alternative options and both measures will help, but the balance between them will change depending on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ children's ability to distance ○ the lay out of the school ○ the feasibility of keeping distinct groups separate while offering a broad curriculum (especially at secondary) <p>It is likely that for younger children the emphasis will be on separating groups, and for older children it will be on distancing. For children old enough, they should also be supported to maintain distance and</p>	<p>Bubble D: Years 5 and 6. They will use the 4 toilets closest to the Year 5 and 6 classrooms.</p> <p>Although school has 4 bubbles, classes within bubbles should be distanced wherever possible. Bubble will predominately only mix outside at lunchtimes or in the hall when they can ensure social distancing between the 2 classes.</p> <p>Measures within the classroom</p> <p>Ideally, adults should maintain 2 metre distance from each other, and from children as far as possible. Teachers will set their classrooms to facilitate this.</p> <p>However, children will need feedback and support from adults as they would previously have received. Adults may, and are expected to, give this support as needed. However, adults should avoid close face to face contact and minimise time spent within 1 metre of anyone. Staff may wear clear visors or face masks in classrooms if they wish. They must be see through to allow children to see faces clearly. See page 7 for information on face shields.</p> <p>This will not be possible when working with many pupils who have complex needs or who need close contact care. These pupils' educational and care support should be provided as normal.</p> <p>For children old enough, they should also be supported to maintain distance and not touch staff and their peers where possible.</p> <p>All pupils from Year 2 and above should be seated side by side and facing forwards. Pupils will have a designated desk place. Those pupils that may</p>			



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		<p>not touch staff where possible.</p> <p>Consistent groups reduce the risk of transmission by limiting the number of pupils and staff in contact with each other to only those within the group. They have been used in school in the summer term in recognition that children, and especially the youngest children, cannot socially distance from staff or from each other and this provides an additional protective measure. Maintaining distinct groups or 'bubbles' that do not mix makes it quicker and easier in the event of a positive case to identify those who may need to self-isolate and keep that number as small as possible.</p> <p>Schools should assess their circumstances and if class-sized groups are not compatible with offering a full range of subjects or managing the practical logistics within and around school, they can look to implement year group sized 'bubbles'. Whatever the size of the group, they should be kept apart from other groups where possible</p>	<p>require additional support will be seated nearer the front.</p> <p>Unnecessary furniture out of classrooms to make more space to have as much space between pupils as possible.</p> <p>Children (Year 1 and above) to have a set place in each class and all pupils will not be able to freely move around school.</p> <p>The number of resources in classes has been reduced/reorganised in order to make sure surfaces can be wiped clean. Wherever possible, resources which are not easily washable or wipeable will be removed.</p> <p>For younger children, the resources made available for child-initiated learning should be carefully considered. Children should be taught to wash their hands frequently, but particularly after using wheeled bikes, trikes and other large, movable toys. Children should be encouraged where possible not to touch their faces or to put objects in their mouths.</p> <p>Interventions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Staff wash hands before and after working with each pupil /group of pupils • A space is identified for the intervention to take place, where the member of support staff will maintain a distance from the pupils. • The school will review groups so that each small group receiving support is drawn from one bubble only • All equipment needed for the child is set up in the space before the start of the session / Pupils will bring all equipment they require with them to the intervention area. • Staff go to the child's classroom, standing at the entrance to collect the 			



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		<p>and older children should be encouraged to keep their distance within groups. Schools with the capability to do it should take steps to limit interaction, sharing of rooms and social spaces between groups as much as possible. When using larger groups the other measures from the system of controls become even more important, to minimise transmission risks and to minimise the numbers of pupils and staff who may need to self-isolate. We recognise that younger children will not be able to maintain social distancing, and it is acceptable for them not to distance within their group.</p> <p>All teachers and other staff can operate across different classes and year groups in order to facilitate the delivery of the school timetable. This will be particularly important for secondary schools. Where staff need to move between classes and year groups, they should try and keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can, ideally 2 metres from other adults. Packed lunches only. Outside areas to be zoned for different bubbles (trim trails/tyres not to be used initially – pending additional risk assessment).</p> <p>All children will eat lunches in the hall. Areas will be allocated to each bubble and only one bubble will be in the hall at a time. Staff will clean tables and chairs between uses.</p> <p>Outside toy boxes to be allocated to each bubble. This should be individual use toys. Toys should be sanitised after each use. Hands should be avoided with rackets/feet used. Contact games (football etc) are not permitted. Hand washing before and after use of playtime toys.</p> <p>Use of communal staff areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use of staff rooms should be minimised • Staff must maintain 2-metre social distancing whilst using staff facilities. • Staff must wear face coverings in communal areas not visors. Face coverings should not be worn in classrooms but should allow children to see staff faces, particularly for phonics lessons. • Staff breaks are staggered wherever possible. • Maximum of two members of staff in the offices • Floor markings and signage to remind staff. • Sanitizer to be used before using hot water, fridge etc. • Staff to place own utensils in the dishwasher – must not be left unwashed at the sink. Dishwasher to be run on a long cycle.. • Staff and governor meetings to be held virtually where possible 			



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			<p>Signage, posters and training: posters encouraging social distancing and the importance of maintaining hygiene levels must be displayed around the school.</p> <p>Staggered start and finish times: Communicate the start and finish times with parents, drop off and collection, including that gathering at the school gates and otherwise coming onto the site without an appointment is not allowed.</p> <p>Usual school day times will be followed – 8.50am until 3.15. Children will use their external classroom entrances. 2 metre markings on playground and pathways will still be in place.</p> <p>Pupils use hand sanitizer on entry to school, then will be sent individually to hang their coat up and wash their hands.</p> <p>Other considerations Social stories will be developed where appropriate for SEND children so that they are prepared for the changes.</p> <p>Supply teachers/peripatetic teachers can move between schools however they should maintain minimise contact and maintain as much distance as possible.</p> <p>Visitors: From January 2021, all visitors including parents must wear a face covering when on site. Parents must do so to collect and drop off children even if only going onto the school playground. Where possible, visits should take place outside of school hours. Parents must be asked to arrange telephone appointments should discussions with teachers be required. Face-to-face meetings must be discouraged. Urgent face-to-face meetings taken must ensure that social distancing is maintained.</p>			



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			<p>Visitors should be asked that if they have symptoms or have been in contact with anyone who has symptoms that they do not enter the school grounds. Hygiene and physical distancing should be explained before or on arrival. Hand washing should take place immediately before and after a meeting.</p> <p>The office will no longer be 'open', messages will be via email and appointments telephone/virtual.</p> <p>Deliveries - Deliveries to be left outside/lobby where social distancing is maintained. Staff should not need to sign for deliveries.</p> <p>Resources:</p> <p>Classroom based resources, such as books and games, can be used and shared within the bubble; these should be cleaned regularly, along with all frequently touched surfaces. Resources that are shared between classes or bubbles, such as sports, art and science equipment should be cleaned frequently and meticulously and always between bubbles, or rotated to allow them to be left unused and out of reach for a period of 48 hours (72 hours for plastics) between use by different bubbles.</p> <p>Outdoor playground equipment should be more frequently cleaned.</p> <p>Pupils must limit the amount of equipment they bring into school each day, to essentials such as lunch boxes, hats, coats and books. Bags are allowed.</p> <p>Pupils and teachers can take books and other shared resources home, although unnecessary sharing should be avoided, especially where this does not contribute to pupil education and development. Hands should be cleaned</p>			



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			<p>before and after use. These resources should also be cleaned / rotated.</p> <p>Entry and exit points (classrooms): where possible, we will use doors leading outside in addition to the main door leading in from corridors. - Fire doors to be used for entry to bubbles and at playtimes.</p> <p>Entry and exit points (main access): The gate on Greenway will remain the only entrance/exit into school with the internal gates being used to enter classrooms Communication to parents informing them that they should not gather at the school gates to talk to other parents.</p> <p>Corridor usage: there is low risk of contagion though passing people in corridors, however, they should only be used for safe rapid-transit from one place to another.</p> <p>Fire strategy: we have reviewed our fire evacuation strategy, taking into account the need to ensure class groups do not interact during an evacuation. The muster points must be capable of accommodating these groups whilst maintaining at least two metres between each bubble. A planned evacuation must be completed the first week of reopening.</p>

PPE is only needed in a very small number of cases, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> where an individual child or young person becomes ill with coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms while at schools, and only then if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained 	5	2	10

Risk to health due to COVID-19	Response to infection	Engage with the NHS Test and Trace process (Must be followed in every case where they are relevant)	<p>Communicate requirement that staff and parents will need to be ready and willing to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> book a test if they are displaying symptoms. Staff and pupils must not come into the school if they have symptoms, and must be sent home to self-isolate if they develop them in school. All children can be tested, including children under 5, but children aged 11 and under will need to 	5	2	10



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			<p>be helped by their parents/carers if using a home testing kit</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - provide details of anyone they have been in close contact with if they were to test positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) or if asked by NHS Test & Trace - self-isolate if they have been in close contact with someone who develops coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms or someone who tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) <p>Anyone who displays symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) can and should get a test. Tests can be booked online through the NHS testing and tracing for coronavirus website, or ordered by telephone via NHS 119 for those without access to the internet.</p> <p>Issue test to parents/carers collecting a child who has developed symptoms at school, or staff who have developed symptoms at school, where they think providing one will significantly increase the likelihood of them getting tested. Advice will be provided alongside these kits.</p> <p>Schools should ask parents and staff to inform them immediately of the results of a test:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - if someone tests negative, if they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to coronavirus (COVID-19), they can stop self-isolating. They could still have another virus, such as a cold or flu – in which case it is still best to avoid contact with other people until they are better. Other members of their household can stop self-isolating. - if someone tests positive, they should follow the ‘stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection’ and must continue to self-isolate for at least 7 days from the onset of their symptoms and then return to school only if they do not 			



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			<p>have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell/taste. This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. The 7-day period starts from the day when they first became ill. If they still have a high temperature, they should keep self-isolating until their temperature returns to normal. Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 14 days.</p> <p>Parents will receive the above information via email and it will be displayed on our web-site.</p> <p>From January, staff have been offered Lateral Flow tests to identify asymptomatic cases. A separate risk assessment had been written. Staff should not attend school if a positive Lft result or if 2 void tests are reported on the same day. Instead they should book an appointment for a PCR test. If this is negative, they may return to school.</p>			
Risk to health due to COVID-19	Response to infection	Manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community (Must be followed in every case where they are relevant)	<p>Swift action must be taken when we become aware that someone who has attended has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19). The HT should be informed to contact the local health protection team. <i>This team will also contact schools directly if they become aware that someone who has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) attended the school – as identified by NHS Test and Trace.</i></p> <p>The health protection team will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who has been in close contact with the person during the period that they were infectious, and ensure they are asked to self-isolate.</p> <p>Based on the advice from the health protection team, schools must send home those people who have been in close contact with the person who has tested positive, advising them to self-isolate for 14 days since they were last in close</p>	5	2	10



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			<p>contact with that person when they were infectious. Close contact means:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - direct close contacts - face to face contact with an infected individual for any length of time, within 1 metre, including being coughed on, a face to face conversation, or unprotected physical contact (skin-to-skin) - proximity contacts - extended close contact (within 1 to 2 metres for more than 15 minutes) with an infected individual - travelling in a small vehicle, like a car, with an infected person <p>The health protection team will provide definitive advice on who must be sent home. To support them in doing so, we will keep a record of pupils and staff in each group, and any close contact that takes places between children and staff in different groups. This should be a proportionate recording process. 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Coronavirus (COVID-19) specific risk assessment notes:

Everyone needs to assess and manage the risks from coronavirus (COVID-19). **This means school employers and leaders are required by law to think about the risks the staff, pupils and young people face and do everything reasonably practicable to minimise them, recognising they cannot completely eliminate the risk of coronavirus (COVID-19).** School employers must therefore make sure that a risk assessment has been undertaken to identify the measures needed to reduce the risks from coronavirus (COVID-19) so far as is reasonably practicable and make the school COVID-secure. General information on how to make a workplace COVID-secure, including how to approach a coronavirus (COVID-19) risk assessment, is provided by the [HSE guidance on working safely](#).

Schools should undertake a coronavirus (COVID-19) risk assessment by considering the measures in this guidance to inform their decisions and control measures. A risk assessment is not about creating huge amounts of paperwork, but rather about identifying sensible measures to control the risks in the workplace, and the role of others in supporting that. The risk assessment will help school leaders and employers decide whether they have done everything they need to. **Employers have a legal duty to consult their employees on health and safety in good time. It also makes good sense to involve pupils (where applicable), young people and parents in discussions around health and safety decisions to help them understand the reasons for the measures being put in place.** Employers can do this by listening and talking to them about how the school will manage risks from coronavirus (COVID-19) and make the school COVID-secure. The people who do the work are often the best people to understand the risks in the workplace and will have a view on how to work safely. **Involving them in making decisions shows that the school takes their health and safety seriously.**

Sharing your risk assessment

Schools should share the results of their risk assessment with their workforce. If possible, they should consider publishing it on their website to provide transparency of approach to parents, carers and pupils (HSE would expect all employers with over 50 staff to do so).

Monitoring and review of risk controls

It is important that employers know how effective their risk controls are. **They should monitor and review the preventive and protective measures regularly, to ensure the measures are working, and taking action to address any shortfalls.**

School employers should have active arrangements in place to monitor that the controls are:

- effective
- working as planned
- updated appropriately considering any issues identified and changes in public health advice

Consulting employees (general)

Leaders are encouraged to ensure that consultation on any changes to risk assessments that will be in place for the start of the autumn term commence with staff before the summer break, to ensure that those that are on term-time only contracts have adequate time to contribute.
