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Maths

Today we are going to look at ordering numbers. This is from when we looked at Place Value back in the Autumn term. See if you can write your answers down in your blue book (you don't have to print off the sheets).

Success Criteria

- 1. Check to see if you are being asked to show the numbers in ascending order (starting with the least and getting greater) or descending order (starting with the greatest and getting less).
- 2. Decide what the number representation shows remember to check for each place value, ones, tens, hundreds and thousands.
- 3. Watch out for place values that may be missing they might need a place holder!
- 4. Carefully begin comparing your numbers, start comparing the highest place value first, then work down.
- 5. If numbers have the same digit in the same place value, go to compare the next place value down.
- 6. Use our mathematical symbols: < > or =
- 7. Remember to check your answers at the end have you used the Success Criteria, does your answer make sense?

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
