So, today for English please look at yesterday's lesson: Wednesday 29th April - it's all about apostrophes again, this time for showing possession, when something belongs to someone or something! Again, this is something we worked really hard on at school, so I expect you'll rise to these challenges really successfully!

Remember to read the whole sentence to work out if you are thinking about a singular or plural noun, and whether something belongs to it/them. Here is an example to help:

Cat = one cat

Cats = more than one cat; plural

Cat's = something belongs to one cat; singular possessive

Cats' = something belongs to more than one cat; plural possessive

Common exceptions: child = singular, children = plural; person = singular, people = plural, man = singular, men = plural; woman = singular, women = plural; mouse = singular, mice = plural.

Again, I bet you'll be great at this - see how well you can impress your adults at home with your possessive apostrophe skills! 😳
