So, today for English please look at yesterday's lesson: Wednesday 29th April - it's all about apostrophes again, this time for showing possession, when something belongs to someone or something! Again, this is something we worked really hard on at school, so I expect you'll rise to these challenges really successfully!

There are two video clips to watch, then:

1. An online highlighting video to revise what you've just seen.
2. A rewriting activity where you need to decide if the noun (person, place or thing) is singular or plural, so you know where to put the apostrophe.
3. A possessive apostrophes worksheet, which I have downloaded for you.
4. A super challenge worksheet looking at possessive plural nouns - where something belongs to more than one thing - which I have also downloaded for you.

Remember to read the whole sentence to work out if you are thinking about a singular or plural noun, and whether something belongs to it/them. Here is an example to help:

Cat = **one** cat

Cats = **more than one** cat; **plural**

Cat's = something **belongs to one** cat; **singular possessive**

Cats' = something **belongs to more than one** cat; **plural possessive**

Common exceptions: child = singular, children = plural; person = singular, people = plural, man = singular, men = plural; woman = singular, women = plural; mouse = singular, mice = plural.

Again, I bet you'll be great at this - see how well you can impress your adults at home with your possessive apostrophe skills! 😊
